# PLEASE HELP US REACH OUR GOAL

We continue to have a busy year at the Wyoming County SPCA, and perhaps you've seen some of our improvements. We were thrilled over the last year to receive small grants from the Bailey and Friends program via the Golisano Foundation.

Last year, we were able to replace all the outdated fluorescent lighting in the animal areas. This helps our visitors find their best "furry pal," and also ensures that volunteers and staff can have areas well-lit to provide the best care and sanitation for our animal friends.

This year, we were just notified that Bailey & Friends will help us equip a small medical surgical unit on the first floor of the shelter. This area will allow us to partner more frequently with our shelter veterinarian to provide low-cost spay/neuter/vaccination clinics at the shelter on a regular basis. As part of the expected New York State Companion Animal Grant award, we've already started using some of our matching required funds to do major work on the driveway and parking area and have scheduled a roof replacement for the end of June.

You can help us continue to improve the SPCA, so that we are able to better serve Wyoming County residents and surrounding areas. We're in desperate need of funding to help us mitigate severe drainage/flooding issues in the basement and foundation of the shelter, and future plans include regrading the dog yard, as well as building a small addition to the shelter to have a separate visitor entrance with handicapped ramp into the new medical/surgical area.

We have so much to do, and we appreciate the help any of you can give!

# A MOM AND A MIRACLE



When it comes to parenting, cats display a remarkable instinct to care for and protect their young. The father cat may also play a role in raising kittens, providing food and protection for the family. Recently, Donna and Patrick Harrington discovered a feral mom and five kittens living under the porch steps of their neighbor's home. They started feeding the mom, and soon the babies started eating the soft food they provided. They also started to trust them, and while the mom kept a bit of distance, the kittens started to play with them. Knowing they could now safely catch them; they contacted our shelter for help. On the evening before they were to be picked up by our foster volunteer, something scared the kittens. When Patrick and Donna arrived with the food, they discovered the smallest of the kittens had tried to hide in a drainpipe and was now six feet underground, standing in water with no way of crawling out. Her cries were heart wrenching. After numerous calls for help failed, they realized the only hope the kitten had was to find and cling to a rope they placed down the hole. In time, the

kitten found it but kept falling off as the rope was pulled up. Everyone was astonished when the third time the rope was lowered, the mother stood behind Patrick and grabbed the rope with her mouth, dug her back feet into the ground and pulled with all her might. It was an amazing sight to witness... but the kitten fell once more. At that point, a big black male cat appeared on the scene, and they all assumed it was the father, whom nobody had seen before. He stood close by and watched. Finally, securing the rope with a large stone, they told the mom she had to call her baby. She looked at them, put her face to the pipe, and started talking to her kitten. Just then, like the miracle it was, the tiny kitten crawled up and out. She was wet, shaking and stood close to her mother. She was ok. After a harrowing 11 hours underground, she was not only happy. She was very hungry. Her foster dad named her, "Piper." Piper, her mom, her father, and her four brothers will be available for adoption soon! We look forward to another happy ending...this time for the whole family!


Give 716 is an online donation drive that helps support nonprofit organizations in Western New York. It is organized by the Buffalo Bills

# "MISTY AND MIA"



# TACKLING TICKS ON YOUR PETS

Like humans, your cat or dog can encounter ticks when they are outside and can get sick with tickborne diseases. They can also transport ticks from outside to inside, where the ticks may then bite people.

#### **Tips for Prevention:**

- Check pets who go outdoors daily for ticks. When checking your pet for ticks, a nose-to-tail search works best. Start at your furry friend's head, and look inside their ears, around their eyes, and under their collar.
- Use a tick preventive product on your dog. Cats are extremely sensitive to a variety of chemicals. Do not apply any tick prevention products to your cats without first asking your veterinarian!
- Watch your pet closely for changes in behavior or appetite if you know or suspect that a tick has bitten it. Signs of tickborne disease may not appear for 7-21 days or longer after a tick bite.
- Reduce tick habitat in your yard. The places you are likely to find ticks include unmown yards with tall grass and weeds, low-lying and overgrown shrubs, unkempt plants and ground cover.

If you find a tick attached to your pet, do not use any substance for removal. Have a helper hold your pet still, if possible. Then, part your pet's fur down to the skin, grasp the tick as close as possible to your pet's skin without pinching, and slowly and steadily pull upward to remove the tick. Check the bite site to ensure you removed the tick's head and mouth parts and, if not, try again. Avoid squeezing the tick's body because the tick will inject pathogens into your pet.

Place the tick in a jar of rubbing alcohol and take a clear picture to help with identification of the tick should your pet become ill. Clean the bite spot with antiseptic and wash your hands thoroughly.

It is a season during which it seems as if tiny little ones are crawling out of every nook and crevice throughout our community; some of which need medical attention, or even 24/7 care from a foster Mom. # **DID YOU KNOW?**



In one 48-hour period the cat on the left received 217 inquiries. The cat on the right received only 3 inquiries. They both went up for pre-adoption at the same time.

Black Cat Syndrome is a very real phenomenon. Black-coated cats are often overlooked in shelter systems and rescues. They are more likely to be euthanized in overcrowded shelters, and we have even heard of rescue shelters shamefully refusing to take on black cats and kittens. To top it off, black cats face absurd and ridiculous stigmas which place them in danger. Ironically, black cats are often the most affectionate and loving cats.

When choosing to adopt, consider a black cat or kitten. Their odds of adoption are limited, and they love just as much as any other cat.

If you believe in the power of giving back, the pets in the shelter need you!

We need volunteers to clean cages, fill water and food bowls, provide company to the animals, walk the dogs, play with the cats and kittens, and so much more.
