

We have had an incredibly busy year at the Wyoming County SPCA; and, hopefully, you have been able to visit us to see some of our improvements. We received a grant from the Bailey and Friends Program at the Golisano Foundation, which allowed us to equip a small surgical unit in our shelter. This area will allow us to partner more frequently with our shelter veterinarian, Dr. Jennifer Graf, to provide low-cost spay/neuter/vaccination clinics at the shelter on a regular basis, particularly for our community members. We held our first test of the new surgical area in November and have planned for several other clinics throughout 2025. Contact Jackie at the shelter (585-591-3114) for more information on upcoming clinics.

Springtime saw massive flooding due to a heavy rainy season, requiring us to replace our roof, as well as grade and mill our driveway/parking area to remove massive potholes that made access difficult. Thanks to Jim Krieg Roofing, Locktight Waterproofing, and RJM for helping with these big projects! As the spring kitten season began, we had so many litters of kittens and surrendered animals that our small shelter staff and volunteers, led by our Shelter Manager, Jackie Pinkowski, were kept remarkably busy! As of December 2024, we have rescued over 195 animals.

We were so grateful to receive several private donations and memorials to help offset the expenses of the new roof and driveway/parking areas. In September, we were incredibly surprised to receive a very generous donation from the Golisano Foundation, which will allow us to remodel our facility and significantly increase our assistance to our local communities over the next few years.

We worked to have the basement and foundation walls waterproofed and replaced our sump pumps to reduce flooding/drainage issues. And we have recently begun work to reconfigure the dog yard, including installing drainage, grading the yard, and ensuring that our dogs and volunteers working with them have sufficient area for exercise and training now and in the future.

So much has been done, and we have so much more we need to do! Soon, we will be putting a community survey up on our Facebook page and website, so that we can get your input on what are important focus areas for the Wyoming County SPCA to continue to support our local communities. We hope to consider building an addition to the shelter, including having a separate visitor entrance with a new handicapped ramp, as well as improved areas for meet and greet, training areas, and offices.

So, in ending 2024 and moving into 2025 (our 120th year anniversary!), we are so appreciative of your continued support and donations. Together, we can make a significant difference in helping animals and ensuring that our community members find their own fur-babies and shelter services to support animals across our communities. Eat well, exercise and get enough sleep.

Focus on the good times.

Try not to focus on your pets last moments.

Accept your loss. That does not mean forgetting but getting to a point of cherishing good memories.


